**On January 19 (Sunday) at 2:00 pm:**

**Jim Gears: “*Through The Southern Appalachian Highlands*”**

Jim has traveled extensively in the Southern Appalachian Highlands to observe and photograph native azaleas in wild. The Southern Appalachian Highlands Conservancy honored him as their Volunteer of the Year in 1999 and he has received the Bronze Medal from the Valley Forge Chapter. His expertise and beautiful slides are a wonderful introduction to this.

Jim Gears will first take us on a tour of Joan Adcock’s garden. Joan, often called Georgia’s Azalea

Lady, has accumulated thousands of native azaleas over a period of 25-plus years. She has an extensive collection of *R. flammeum* (see photo) and its hybrids. We will then proceed with Jim as he travels through natural areas in Georgia and Alabama, ending at the Great Smoky Mountains National Park during the



peak of the spring wildflower bloom. The rich botanical flora in this region is a perfect complement the magnificent mountain scenery there. Get ready to walk among stands of orange and yellow Flame Azaleas, *R. calendulaceum*, along the Appalachian Trail

near Roan Mountain. Stroll through acres of brilliantly colored hybrids on top of Gregory Bald in the Smokies. Some of the species seen in abundance are Trilliums, Phacelia, Hepatica, *Hexastylis arifolia*, *Hexastylis shuttleworthii*, and *Iris cristata*. The presentation

will concentrate on wildflowers that we can grow in our gardens here in Pa., and are great companion plants for Rhododendrons and azaleas. Many are available at the annual Rhododendron Society plant sale at Jenkins Arboretum.

**Gregg Tepper: “*Sensory Appeal of Native Plants*”**

Gregg Tepper is a professional horticulturist, lecturer, consultant and life-long native plant enthusiast. After studying Ornamental Horticulture at the University of Delaware and creating his own ornamental and native plant gardens, Gregg then started his own horticultural maintenance business designing and managing private gardens. He has lectured on native plants extensively in the United States as well as at the Royal Botanic



Gardens, Kew and Wisley in Great Britain. He volunteers annually as a horticulture passer at the Philadelphia International Flower Show and pursues many botanizing excursions, to photograph and study plant communities, throughout the year. Gregg previously worked at Mt. Cuba Center in Hockessin, DE where he held the positions of Horticulturist, Woods Path Horticulturist and Director of Horticulture. He is now Acting

Director and board member ex officio of the Delaware Botanic Gardens at Pepper Creek. Join Horticulturist Gregg Tepper as he explores the unique and fascinating ways in which Native Plants appeal to each of our

senses: Sight, Smell, Touch, Taste, and even Sound. Learn little-known facts, hear entertaining true stories, and see outstanding photographs of the wildflowers we love of the forest and field.

**On March 20 (Thursday) at 7:30 pm:**

**Mike O'Hara: "East Coast-West Coast Hybrids of Jim Barlup"**

Mike O'Hara has been an ARS member for 10 years and is President of the Princeton Chapter. Mike has 3/4 of an acre full of rhododendrons and deciduous azaleas. He has hybridized for 5 years and has approximately 500 seedlings in cold frames in his yard from seedlings started the past 2 years. His objective is creating better yellow, orange and purple hybrid rhododendrons. Mike has worked with Jim Barlup (see photo) for 4 years now. Jim has supplied many of his hybrids to Mike to test in his garden. Jim has also sent Mike many packets of seed and capsules of pollen.



prolific and one of the best hybridizers in our country today. Jim's stated goal: "as a West Coast hybridizer, I want to introduce more East Coast hybrids into my garden. My goal is to merge the wide range of Western colors with Eastern hardiness to produce new plants for hybridizers and growers on both coasts." Jim is well known for his East-West hybridizing program. Jim Barlup was

awarded the ARS Gold Medal in 2004 in part for his generously sharing breeding material and insights, making over 1,000 crosses each year, critically evaluating his seedlings, and encouraging nurseries and others to test grow his most beautiful selections. Jim is also a professional photographer and has supplied Mike with beautiful photos of his best hybrids. It is amazing what Jim Barlup has produced and many of these are hardy in the East.

Mike will present pictures of many of Jim Barlup's beautiful Hybrids and show some of Jim's methods of hybridizing. Jim Barlup is a member of the Cascade and Seattle chapters of the ARS in Washington State. Jim is the most

## Plant Labels are available for Chapter Members

In cooperation with Jenkins Arboretum, plant labels are made for VF ARS members from January through March. If you have any questions, please contact Eva Jackson ([noelevajackson@comcast.net](mailto:noelevajackson@comcast.net)). Labels will be made **only** for members and only for their **own use**. The sequence of orders processed will give priority to active members.

**Quantity:** 96 labels maximum per order/member.

**Cost: \$20.00 for 1 to 96 labels**, with check made out to Valley Forge Chapter, ARS, and money passed on to Jenkins.

### Writing the information for labels:

Each line of a WP document becomes one plant label of one or two lines (your choice, depending also on how much info you want to have listed). If you want two lines, the lines must be separated by a semicolon (;) and no spaces. The lines must be single-spaced (for a total of 96 lines maximum).

### Examples:

P.J.M.:(Weston) = 2 lines on plant label, no spaces before or after semicolon  
Girard's Pleasant White = 1 line on plant label

### Notes:

- 1) No line on the plant label can be longer than 26 characters (including spaces). If you have 2 lines, neither line can be longer than 26 characters (including spaces).
- 2) The format is yours, i.e., it may be 'P.J.M.' or

just P.J.M. Plant names should not be abbreviated.

3) Species names cannot be italicized by the engraving machine.

**Checking label information:** After you have prepared your list (as outlined above) and thoroughly checked/rechecked your own resources, you are encouraged, but not required, to send or e-mail your copy to Eva Jackson ([noelevajackson@comcast.net](mailto:noelevajackson@comcast.net)) for a final check of spelling and other errors (yes they do creep in!). The copy will be returned to you promptly, with suggestions, if necessary, but you have the final say. However, it cannot be emphasized enough how important it is to check for accuracy of labels that cannot be corrected once engraved and that may pass on false information on numerous occasions (plant sales, flower/truss shows, cuttings exchanges, garden tours).

**Engraving label information:** The final plant list should be emailed to Harold Sweetman at: [Harold@jenkinsarboretum.org](mailto:Harold@jenkinsarboretum.org), with 'metal plant labels' in the subject line. Labels are machine-engraved by a Jenkins Arboretum staff member onto large sheets.

**Finishing labels:** The engraved label sheets must be cut into individual labels, their corners rounded, and a hole punched for wiring. **This job needs to be done by you** at Jenkins Arboretum (with tools provided and as instructed). Wire for attaching label to plant is **not** provided.

### Every purchase benefits the ARS

At the October 4, 2013, ARS Board of Directors meeting, the Board authorized the creation of an online ARS website that would not be selling items but would link to other providers. The online store was authorized to use the ARS logo and name to sell ARS logo merchandise and develop a relationship with Amazon as an affiliate store. Product providers accessed through the ARS online store at [ARSStore.org](http://ARSStore.org) pay referral fees directly to the ARS on sales made from [ARSStore.org](http://ARSStore.org) referrals. These fees from sales referrals go 100% to the ARS.



The store has three divisions:

1. **ARS Logo Merchandise:** featuring knit, woven and denim shirts, jackets, caps, visors, and computer briefcases.
2. **Amazon Merchandise:** featuring Rhododendron & Azalea Books, Garden Books, Garden Tools, and any other item sold on Amazon.
3. **Participating Merchants:** featuring other merchants who agree to give referral fees to the ARS for each purchase when you mention [ARSStore.org](http://ARSStore.org).

### ARSStore.org has no expenses, only earnings.

To access each division, go to [ARSStore.org](http://ARSStore.org) and from there select what interests you. If you don't see an item, use the Amazon search feature. Amazon sells just about everything. You get the same low Amazon prices from the ARS store, but by using it the ARS gets a fee for referring you. As long as you go to Amazon from [ARSStore.org](http://ARSStore.org) before making a purchase, the ARS gets a referral fee.



You may wonder if people who are not members of the ARS may use [ARSStore.org](http://ARSStore.org). Yes, most certainly! The objective of creating the ARSStore website is to raise money for the ARS. The more money we raise, the better it is for the ARS. Invite all of your friends to use it.

The referral rate starts at 4%. If a total of 7 or more items are purchased from Amazon in a month, the rate is 6% or more. Typically it will be between 6% and 6.5%. It is 17% on ARS Logo Merchandise.

### From A Guide for the Hungry Gardener: Beth Smith's Cranberry Pie

- 2 cups fresh cranberries
- 1/2-3/4 cup chopped walnuts or pecans
- 1 1/3 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup flour
- 1/2 cup melted butter
- 1/4 cup vegetable oil

Butter a 10-inch deep pie plate. Wash and drain cranberries, removing stems. Place berries and nuts in bottom of pan, then sprinkle 1/3 cup of sugar over all. To make batter, beat eggs, stir in remaining 1 cup of sugar. Pour batter, which will be fairly thick, over berries and nuts. Bake 1 hour at 350°. Serve warm to 8.

## 2014 Gardens Tour in Northern Germany and Denmark

The ARS Board attempted to get the Danish Chapter to hold a convention following the 2014 ARS convention in Cleveland but was unable to arrange it. The Board subsequently asked William R. Heller, president of the Seattle chapter, to plan a rhododendron garden tour of Denmark and Northern

Below is the itinerary for this '2014 Rhododendron Garden Tours in Northern Germany and Denmark'. The tour will leave just after the 2014 ARS Convention in May in Cleveland, OH. You do not have to attend the convention to go on this tour of Northern Europe. We will all meet at one of 2 hubs: either JFK or Newark in the East, or Seattle in the West, to fly to Hamburg, Germany. A Coach will pick us up and take us to the rhododendron Gardens and sites in Northern Germany and Denmark.

The cost is \$3,975 each for double occupancy rooms (\$4,400 for single occupancy). The

Tour includes round-trip Airfare from the airline hubs, coach and driver, hotels, all breakfasts and 4 dinners. The fare is based on present exchange rates and fees and should be accurate within about 10%.

We ask that everyone on the tour meet at one of the two airline's hubs and fly as a group to Hamburg, so we know everyone will be there when we arrive in Hamburg. Once we know who is going and from where they are coming from, group airfares to Europe will be arranged and we will let people know exactly where they need to meet the group.

The itinerary sets out an exciting twelve-day tour sure to delight rhododendron lovers.
