As they traveled the world for Ralph’s lectures, they began to accumulate unique artifacts from many countries and cultures. In 1979 with encouragement from family and friends, Liz founded Garden Accents!



Liz now writes articles and lectures at universities, The Pennsylvania Horticultural Society, and garden clubs around the country on garden design and the use of garden ornaments. Her pieces have enhanced many award winning exhibits at the prestigious Philadelphia Flower Show as well as the Vassar Design House and other local events. In 1996, Garden Accents won the blue ribbon for their first commercial booth at the Philadelphia Flower Show and again received a First Prize in 1999 and 2000. Philadelphia Magazine rated Garden Accents “Best of Philly” in 1996, 1998, 2000 and 2006. Besides gardening, Liz enjoys antiques, folk art, tennis, paddle tennis, traveling, reading and her three wonderful grandchildren.

Karel Bernady awarded ARS Gold Medal

There's no doubting the appropriateness of an honor when the award committee elevates the honoree to a level higher than the nominators were thinking. That's the back-story to the news that Karel F. Bernady, former president of the Greater Philadelphia Chapter and indispensable man-about-the-genus, was awarded the American Rhododendron Society's Gold Medal.

The award was presented on May 9, 2015, at the society's annual conference in Sidney, British Columbia. It took some coaxing, but Karel was there to receive the award in person.

The Gold Medal is the highest award given by the society, and its recipients through the years include some exalted individuals, such as Joseph Gable, David Leach, Fred Galle, Peter Cox, and Hans Hachmann.

Karel is the fifth Greater Philadelphia Chapter member to receive the Gold Medal. The first four were John Wister (1962), Alfred Martin (1976), Gertrude Wister (1982) and Polly Hill (1990).

Peg Van Patton was the driving force in organizing nominating letters for Karel to receive the Silver Medal. Well into the process, word was passed to Peg that the nominators might think more grandly. Various letters touting Karel's award-worthiness were amended to recommend the gold. The Honors Committee of the society, chaired by Dee Daneri, receives nominations and determines whether an award is to be granted.

At the [Greater Philadelphia] chapter picnic in June, Ann Mangels, Eastern Vice President of the society, did a reprise presentation of the Gold Medal, reading the citation for all to hear.

Ann, who is next in line to become national ARS president, also explained the differences in the three medals the society bestows. Chapters award bronze Medals to individuals who have made a significant mark on chapters affairs. Both the Silver and Gold are awarded at the national level. The Silver, Ann explained, is not a “junior gold medal,” but is intended to recognize exemplary work at a regional level. Someone receiving the Gold Medal has offered noteworthy service to the society on a national level.

Here’s are excerpts from nominators’ letters: “Karel is a facilitator, one of those behind-the-scenes persons who is a catalyst that causes many other wonderful things to happen in our organization. He is extremely generous with his time and resources, and yet he never seeks praise for his efforts. ... Karel is both a leader and a team player. ... Few people in the ARS realize that Karel has a Ph.D. in chemistry because he never boasts of his accomplishments. His strong background in science has served our society well, since he has ably chaired the ARS Research Foundation for a number of years.” – Donald Hyatt“

If you're curious about propagation, this Mr. Rhododendron is a one-stop-shopping font of expertise. The number of plants he has propagated for the Greater Philadelphia Chapter is flabbergasting – but not uncountable, because he keeps immaculate and copious records..” – Michael Martin Mills

“Dr. Karel Bemady has lived up to the term amateur in the true sense of the word, which is derived from the French word meaning ‘lover

of.’ This is the fundamental motivation for all of his dedicated efforts. He loves this work and the genus rhododendron, from the bogs of Sandwich to his efforts on Roan Mountain to conserve the native deciduous azaleas. Driven by Karel’s search for knowledge, this body of work represents a true labor of love.” – Peter Norris

And here’s the text of the citation presented to Gold Medalist Bernady in May:

“Over the course of more than three decades you have distinguished yourself in countless ways as a member of the American Rhododendron Society contributing time, talent, and boundless energy to scores of projects which have educated and informed others.

“You have served as president Greater Philadelphia ARS Chapter; Chairman "Plants For Members"; District 8 Director; Co-Chaired the 2004 ARS International Convention; Chaired the 2009 Eastern Regional Conference; Chaired the Board of ARS Research Foundation; served on ARS Native Azalea Committee; on ARS Endowment Committee; and, ARS *Journal* Editorial Board

“In 2006 you received the Greater Philadelphia Bronze Award. Now teaching members grafting techniques, you have created a valuable electronic rooting/grafting database as a resource tool for ARS.

“For outstanding work and tireless efforts, the American Rhododendron Society is pleased to award Karel F. Bernady, Ph.D. the Gold Medal.”

A Meeting of Two Chapters



On June 2, the Valley Forge (VF) and Greater Philadelphia (GP) ARS Chapters had a joint board of director meeting after their regular individual board meetings.

The meeting discussed the strengths of each of the two chapters. GP has an outstanding propagation program and, hence, a great Plants for Members (P4M) program. GP also leads the efforts to have an ARS booth at the Philadelphia Flower Show every year. On the other hand, VF hosts the Joint Meeting at the Uwchlan Meeting House each February and the District 8 CutX and Auction each August. The Chapters already share responsibility for the Joint Meeting at Uwchlan and alternate sponsorship of the annual spring Flower Show with GP hosting it at Morris Arboretum and VF hosting it at Jenkins Arboretum.

Since VF has had some propagation snafus recently and GP has a very strong propagation program, GP agreed to make its propagation program a joint program with VF members invited to participate. Also, the P4M program would be hosted by GP and open to VF members.

In the spirit of mutual cooperation, the two chapters agreed to not have a chapter meeting during the month the other chapter has its banquet. That means that in November, VF would host both chapters at its banquet, and in April, GP would host both chapters at its banquet.

At no time was there any mention of a merger. The point was to build on the strengths of the two chapters. Hopefully this will initiate a new period of cooperation and create two stronger chapters.

ARS Fall Meeting on Long Island

The Fall ARS Conference will be held on Long Island on October 16-17. The event will start Friday afternoon when the Plant Sale and Book Sale open for the first time. Then from 6 to 8 PM will be a Welcome Reception with “hearty hors d’oeuvres”.

The program starts Saturday morning with Richard Murcott being featured as the opening speaker with the program, “Long Island Legacy”.

Following Richard Murcott will be Karel Bernady with a program on how he has used “Grafting Rhododendrons for Problem Solving.” His meticulous attention to detail and impeccable record keeping show how rooted cutting and grafted plants compare and what are the advantages of each method.

In the afternoon, Bud Gehrich will lead the Hybridizer’s Roundtable.

Don Hyatt will be the Banquet Speaker in the evening with a program, “Things I Tried That Died.”

The plant sale will include many plants not previously available due to rooting or disease problems. Most will be one-year grafts made by George Woodard and other Long Island hybridizers. The plants have been grown-on in Dick Murcott’s nursery, so they may be transported throughout the US without phytosanitary documentation.



Review of new WSU Extension booklet EM091:

Identifying, Treating, and Avoiding Azalea and Rhododendron Problems

This new 40-page booklet replaces the venerable 28-page WSU Extension booklet (EB1229) *How To Identify Rhododendron and Azalea Problems* which was released in 1984 and slightly updated in 1993.

At first glance, it looks much the same but a closer look reveals new content. The first difference is the new key which uses symptoms to identify problems.

EM091 covers some new problems that weren't covered before. They include Botrytis, Phytophthora Blight, root weevil larvae and witches broom. It is disappointing that it does not cover borers.

It still covers symptoms and causes, but a welcome addition is the discussion of prevention and treatment. However, treatment options always include: "See Hortsense (<http://pep.wsu.edu/hortsense/>) for chemical and nonchemical management options."

Totally new is the section on environmental

problems. They include alkaline soil; cold injury to floral buds, vegetative buds and new leaves; cold response to leaves; drought; hypoxia; sunscald; iron and/or manganese deficiency; nitrogen deficiency; pesticide injury; phosphate fertilizer overuse; physiological leaf spot; planting and management errors; and salt damage.

The one major item that is missed is deer. They are probably a major problem in growing azaleas and rhododendrons

The booklet is available both as an [online PDF for \\$5](#) and in hard copy as a [40-page booklet for \\$10 plus shipping](#), about \$15 total. The images in the hard copy booklet are very small and the color rendition is very poor. The images are much better in the PDF. The color is not only much better, but they are high resolution and can be enlarged to get more detail.

For \$5, the PDF is definitely a best buy. Sadly, the poor picture quality in the hard copy is a real turn-off. If you much prefer a printed copy, then you will have to put up with it or spring for the much more expensive, *Compendium of Rhododendron and Azalea Diseases and Pests*.

The new 2nd edition of the comprehensive work, *Compendium of Rhododendron and Azalea Diseases and Pests*, which came out earlier this year, sells for \$99 ([\\$79 to ARS members](#)).

For the serious amateur or the professional, the *Compendium* is definitely much more complete. However, the WSU booklet is definitely very cost effective. When combined with online sources including the WSU Hortsense website, the WSU booklet will suffice for most people. Again, the PDF version has superior picture quality.

From A Guide for the Hungry Gardener:

Barbara Winter's Bourbon Slush

2 tea bags

1 cup boiling water

½ cup sugar

1 6-oz. can ($\frac{2}{3}$ cup) of frozen orange juice concentrate, thawed

3 ½ cup water

½ cup bourbon

½ 6-oz. can ($\frac{1}{3}$ cup) of frozen lemonade concentrate, thawed.

Steep tea bags in 1 cup boiling water for 2 to 3 minutes. Remove tea bags. Add sugar and dissolve. Add remaining ingredients. Pour into freezer containers; freeze firm. Can be stored in freezer for long periods.

On a hot humid day, this is a great thirst quencher. Take out of freezer ½ hour before serving. It needs time to thaw to a slush consistency. Spoon into cocktail glasses. Makes 1 ½ quarts.

ARS Student Membership


